

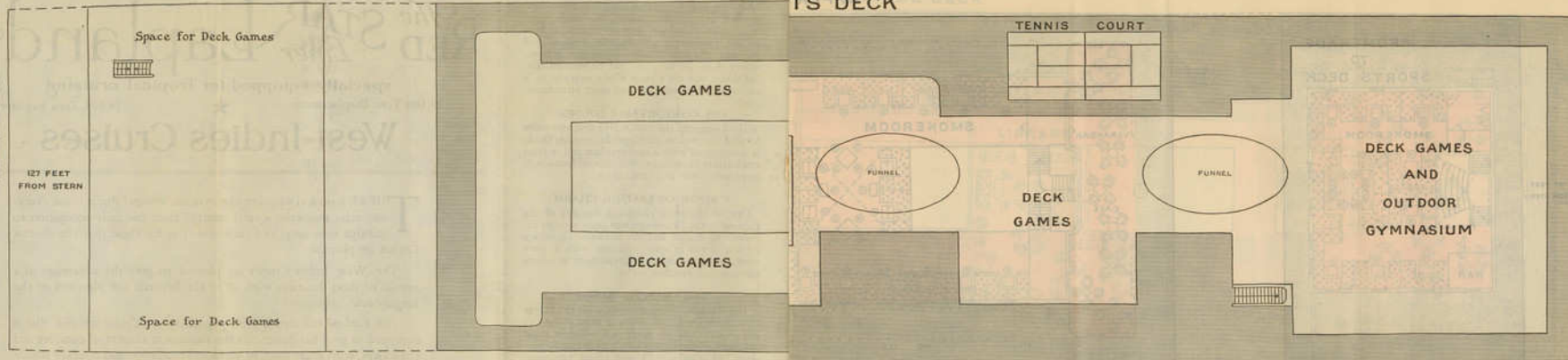

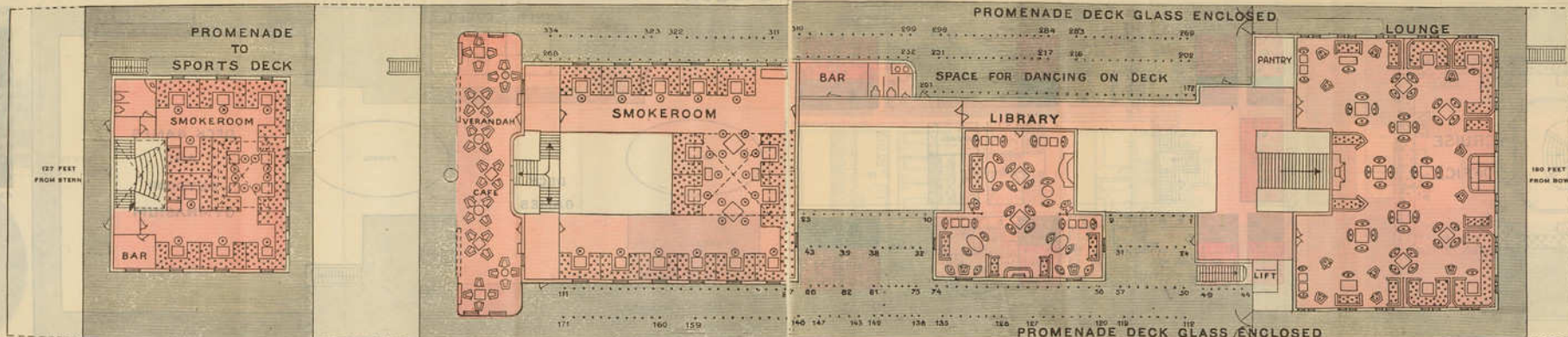

HAVANA AND HISTORIC MORRO CASTLE

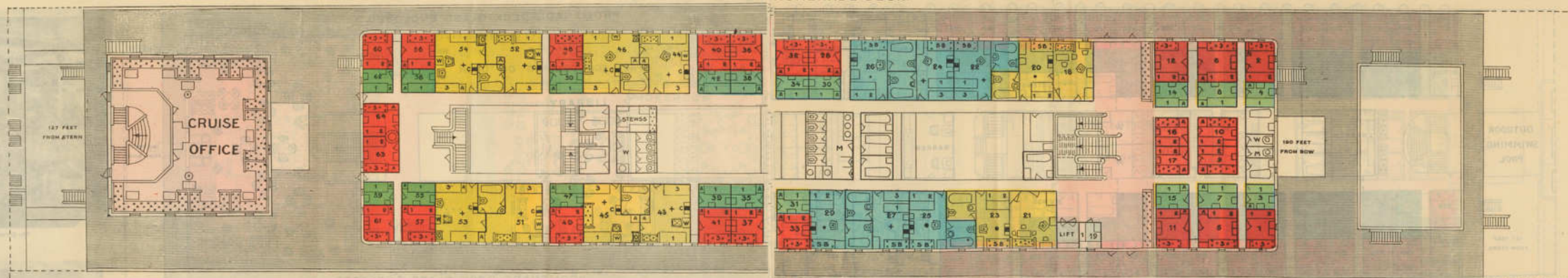
As a sinister sentinel stands beautiful Morro Castle just at the entrance of Havana Harbor. Its moss-covered walls of stone, vari-colored

“Nestling along the harbor the picturesque “White City” lies with its patios and romantic balconies lending an atmosphere of Old Spain. Its beautiful “Prado” and parks and quaint churches, its blue skies and balmy sunshine, the air redolent with the perfume of tropical flowers and fruits, all lend enchantment to Cuban soil. The old Cathedral of Havana abounds in history and legends and in many of the old church yards are to be found interesting tombstones.

interest and education in the way of sugar and tobacco plantations.

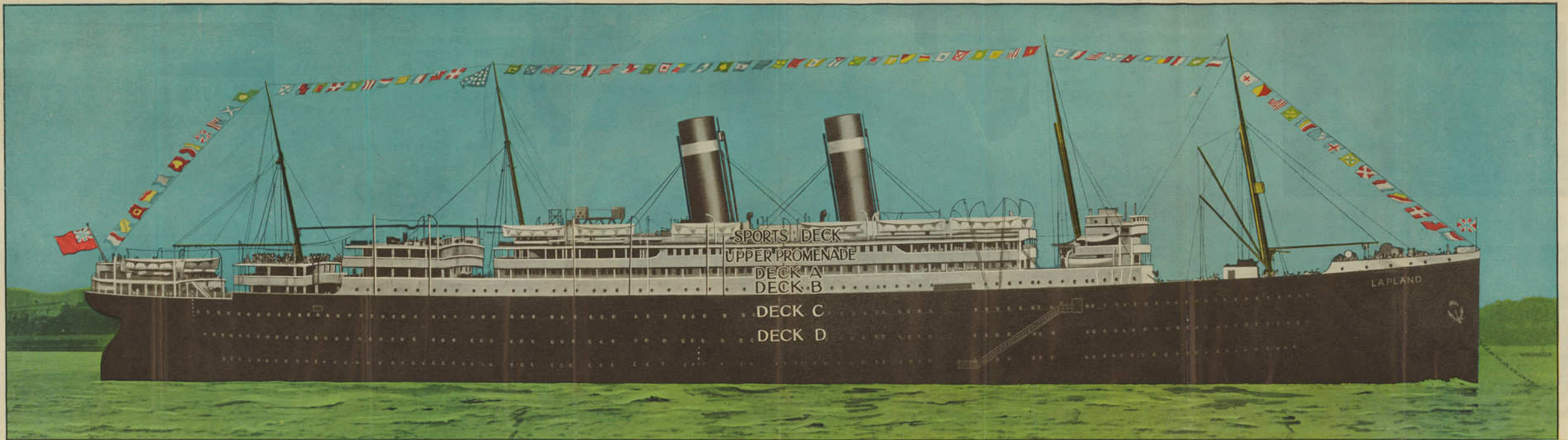
OLD PANAMA AND THE CANAL ZONE

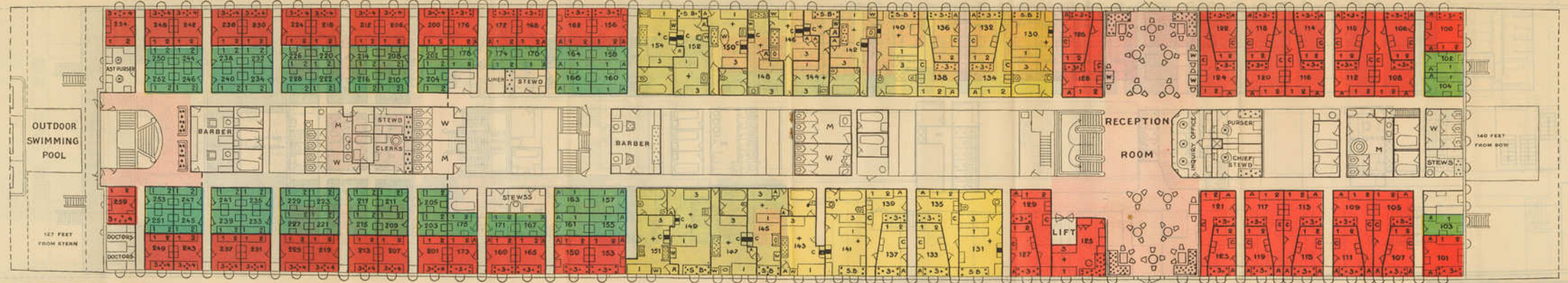
Looking at the Governor's Palace which has been the bone of so much contention, and is now surrounded by heavy iron railings and guarded by two armed sentinels, one cannot

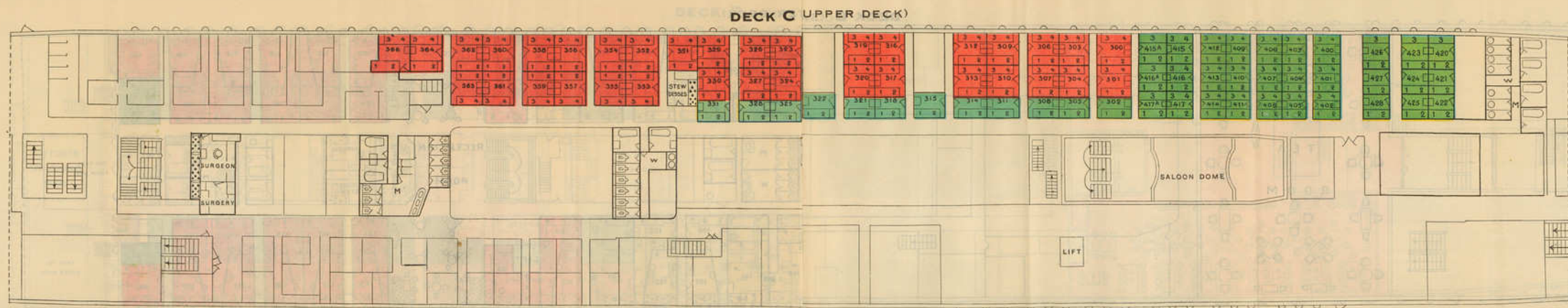

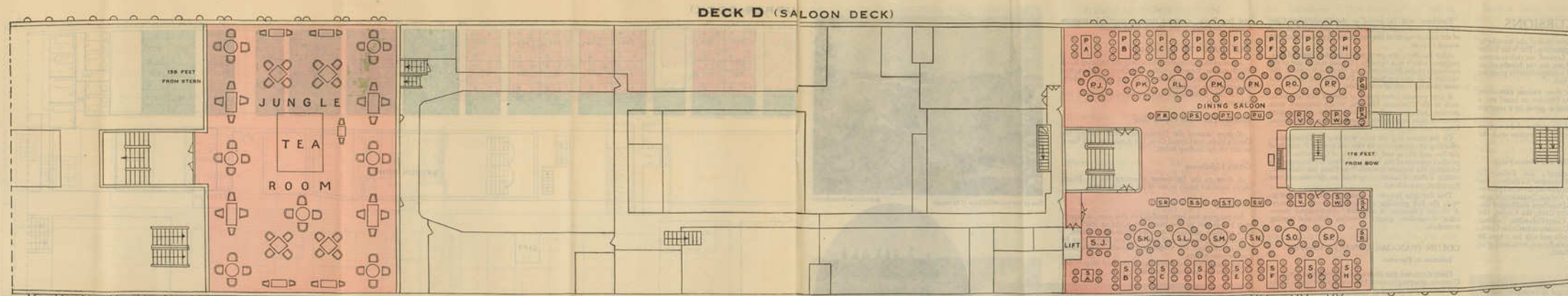
TROPICAL GARDENS OF JAMAICA

shops are most interesting. There is not a motor car on the island and many of the natives have never even seen an automobile. One cannot help longing to see their mental pictures of the horseless carriage.

In Bermuda also the sea-gardens and the beautiful caves with their stalactites and stalagmites which have been hundreds of years in the making, are among the wonders of this fairy-land. One may walk from the heat of the tropical sun at mid-day and shiver with the chill and dampness of any one of the various caves.

VERA CRUZ

Vera Cruz is one of the oldest, quaintest, yet most cosmopolitan of the Mexican coast towns

—an odd blend of the antique and the modern. Fine new buildings stand side by side with diminutive negro cabins. In the broad Campeche Bay you may see ships of all maritime nations, for Vera Cruz is the gateway for the majority of exports and imports of Mexico.

MEXICO CITY

The route from Vera Cruz to Mexico City is one of the most scenic in the world, and from the train, as it climbs from sea level to over 7,000 feet, will be seen cloud capped mountains, tremendous gorges, towering cliffs, roaring waterfalls and as the train nears the summit, we will see 2,000 feet below the village of Maltrata looking like a chess board.

This railroad is undoubtedly one of the marvels of engineering, between Cordoba to Boca del Monte, the train climbs over 5,000 feet in less than 42 miles.

Mexico City will astonish the visitor with its many places of interest, including The National Museum, which possesses more genuine and authentic relics of primitive America than any other museum on the Continent. The National Library, The National Palace, The Cathedral, The National Theatre.

Along the wonderful boulevards will be found many shops where the shopper will find Mexican curios, drawn linens, hand carved leather, Aztec feather work, etc.

In Mexico City is the famous Chapultepec

Park. At the top of Chapultepec Hill is the famous Chapultepec Castle, the official home of the President of Mexico. From the castle can be seen the great snow-capped peaks of Popocatepetl and Ixcacihuatl.

A short distance from Mexico City will be found the Pyramids of San Juan Teotihuacan. Here will be found a museum housing many relics of pre-historic days which have been unearthed during excavations in the last eight years.

Surrounding the Pyramid, is a variety of landings and platforms which form the "court of the Pyramid of the Sun," and nearby is the Pyramid of the Moon and the Temple of Suctralcoatl.

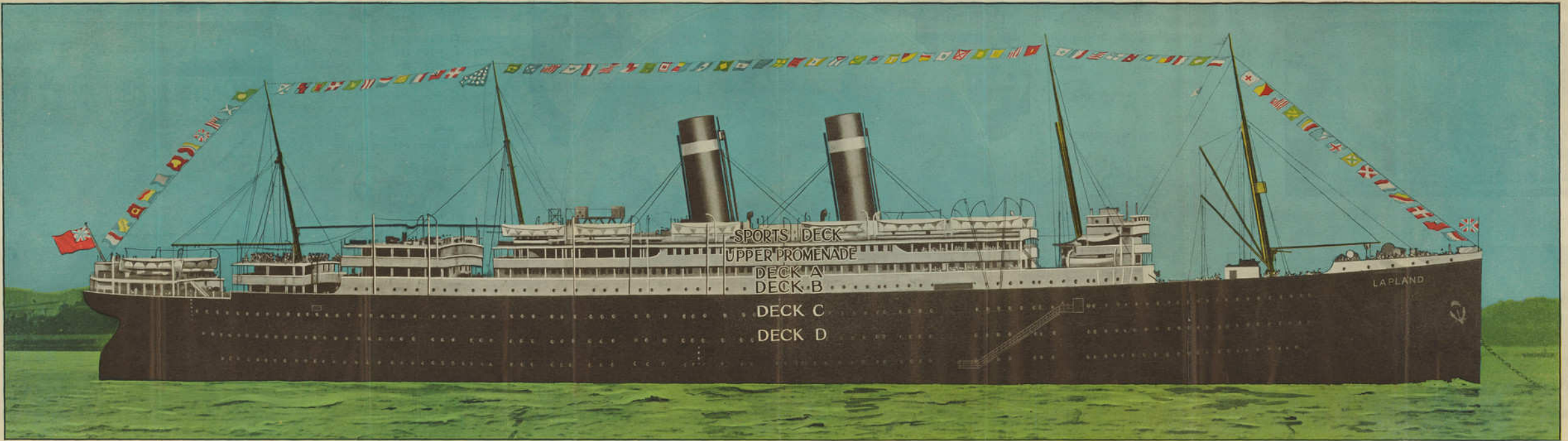
Xochimilco, which is about fifteen miles from the city and known as the Floating Garden, is a most wonderful sight. Here are grown a large variety of flowers for the markets of Mexico City. Xochimilco derives its name of Floating Garden because of its many canals, which are fed by natural springs.

LOVELY NASSAU

The charm of quaint old Nassau is of historic moment. It was on the nearby Watling Island that Columbus first landed. Many old buildings and rugged forts suggest scenes of long-gone romantic days—mighty uncomfortable traveling must have been then—but Nassau today is one of the fairest of languorous winter resorts.

SHORE EXCURSIONS

PROBABLY the first consideration of the traveler in planning his cruise, is sightseeing. The West Indies Cruises as planned on the *Lapland*, are rich in scenes and sights and the Red Star Line, for the benefit of its clients has, therefore, arranged a comprehensive program of sightseeing at each port of call.

Reservations and tickets for these various excursions can be obtained from the Cruise Director on board and a complete outline of the program is given in a separate folder.

We, however, give below a short outline of the various excursions which will be offered in connection with the four cruises.

HAVANA—A Combined City and Country trip

Visiting the Governor-General's old Palace—La Fuerza Fort, the Temple, Columbus Cathedral, the Malecon (Havana's fashionable seawall, drive and promenade), Macao Monument, the Vedado (aristocratic suburb and American Colony), Almendares residential district, Marietas Beach, the Yacht Club, the Casino, the Country Club and Golf Links, Camp Columbia, Tropical Garden, Thence by Paseo de Almendares to Colon Cemetery and ride through the suburbs and city for a visit to the Cigar Factory, the President's Palace, terminating at one of the leading hotels for lunch.

Evening Trip

In order to give our passengers an opportunity of seeing Havana at night, we have arranged an excursion to leave the steamer after dinner at about 8 p.m., visiting the Chinese Quarters, witness an exhibition of the famous Spanish national game—the "Jai Alai," and a visit to the "Gran Casino" (Cuba's Monte Carlo), etc.

VERA CRUZ—for Mexico City

Passengers proceed to Mexico City from Vera Cruz by special train, which will be awaiting the steamer at the Terminal Wharf. The program will include the following: A visit to Xochimilco, some fifteen miles south of the city, often spoken of as the Floating Gardens. Here are a number of islands intersected by waterways, where quantities of flowers and vegetables for the Mexico City market are grown.

On the way to Xochimilco opportunity will be afforded to visit the Convent of Churubusco, closely identified with the campaign of the United States forces under General Scott in 1848. On the way the party will pass the Mexico City Country Club.

Luncheon will be served at the Chapultepec Cafe, located in the beautiful grounds of Chapultepec Park, one of the beauty spots of the world and in romantic charm, second to none.

After luncheon the party will visit the Castle of Chapultepec, which was begun in 1783 and is now one of the residences of the President of the Mexican Republic. The visitors will also see here the Don Quixote fountain, a most pleasing work of modern art.

If time permits other points of interest will be visited, such as the National Museum, which possesses more genuine antiques and authentic relics of primitive America than any other Museum, also the National Library and the famous Cathedral.

On the return trip the train will stop at Teotihuacan, affording an opportunity to visit the famous Pyramids of the Sun and Moon and the Temple of Quetzalcoatl, stupendous remains of the Toltec and Aztec civilizations. On resuming the journey towards Vera Cruz, the train will, within a short distance, drop from an elevation of over 8,300 feet, to sea level.

This daylight journey is amazingly beautiful and reveals the full grandeur of Mexican mountain scenery. A titanic panorama is unfolded—cloud-capped mountains, tremendous gorges, towering cliffs and soaring waterfalls.

COLON (PANAMA CANAL)—Across the Isthmus to Panama

From Cristobal the passengers go by special train to Panama, stopping en route for a visit of the Gatun Locks and Dam. Upon arrival at Gamboa on the north of Gaillard Cut, board chartered launch and proceed through the Gaillard Cut to Pedro Miguel Locks. Thence proceed by train to Panama City, where automobiles will be waiting to transfer the passengers to the Tivoli Hotel for luncheon. Automobile drive after luncheon to Old Panama, through Bella Vista, etc. Return to steamer by special train.

KINGSTON (JAMAICA)—Port Antonio

Excursions have been arranged across the island to the beautiful Port Antonio when luncheon will be served at the Titchfield Hotel.

This trip is one of the most attractive features of the voyage. Throughout the 140-mile drive it affords an unparalleled view of the magnificent tropical flora and scenery for which Jamaica is famous.

Bag Walk

This excursion will include a drive to Spanish Town

and Bag Walk, returning through beautiful mountain scenery, lunching at the Myrtle Bank Hotel.

SAN JUAN—The Big Loop trip

A remarkably interesting drive over the Military Road via Bayamon, Camerino, Cidra, Las Cruces, Caynas, Rio Piedras, and Santurra returning to the Hotel Condado Vanderbilt for luncheon.

This tour includes beautiful views of fruit, cane, and tobacco fields.

BERMUDA—The Crystal Cave

A drive around the Harrington Sound visiting the Devil's Hole, the Crystal Cave, the Aquarium, and lunch at one of the leading hotels.

Gibb's Lighthouse

A drive to the lighthouse returning via the North Shore Road for lunch at one of the leading hotels.

NASSAU

No program has been arranged at this port, as experience has shown us that passengers prefer to select their own program amongst the varied amusements offered. Swimming, tennis, golf and beautiful drives may be indulged in and the magnificent hotels offer a most comfortable retreat.

Our agents will, nevertheless, be on hand to give our passengers any assistance they may require.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Conditions of Passage: The terms and conditions of passage on these cruises are the same as set forth in the contract and cruise membership tickets of The Red Star Line.

The Prices Include: Accommodations and meals on shipboard and landing and embarkation expenses only. All shore expenses additional as outlined in a separate folder.

Reservations: A deposit of 10% of the passage money is required in order to definitely reserve accommodation, and the full amount of passage money should be paid three weeks before sailing.

Shore Excursions: The Red Star Line in arranging shore excursions at the ports of call does so merely on behalf of the passengers for whom it acts as agents. The shore excursions will be in charge of an experienced Cruise Director, who will arrange and carry out all excursions in the best possible manner permitted by local conditions.

Baggage on Shore: The Red Star Line assumes no responsibility for baggage ashore. Every effort, however, will be made to safeguard the passengers' interests.

Baggage Insurance: Passengers are strongly advised to insure their baggage. Full information can be obtained at any Red Star Line Office.

Passports: Cruise passengers do not require passports.

Embarkation: The *Lapland* will sail from Chelsea Piers, North River (West 14th to 23rd Streets), New York. Friends of passengers will be admitted on board the *Lapland*. Passes are not necessary.

Baggage: Any amount of personal effects will be carried free on board the *Lapland*. It is recommended that only one steamer trunk be marked

for "Stateroom." This trunk should not be more than 16 inches high and 45 inches long, so that it can be conveniently placed underneath the bed or berth. Passengers are advised that there is a "Baggage-room" on board conveniently located, where large trunks can be kept and to which access may be had daily. Passengers are requested to provide themselves with duplicate keys for all baggage, including suitcases.

Children: One child occupying a double room with one adult will be charged full tariff.

Two children occupying a double room for their exclusive use will be charged full tariff each.

Each child under ten years of age occupying a berth with two adults in a double room containing three or four berths will be charged half minimum fare.

In the event of a child under ten years of age occupying a berth with one adult in a single room containing two berths, the same rate, namely half minimum fare, will be charged, and the same conditions will apply, the adult paying the one-in-room rate.

Servants: When berthed in special servants' quarters the charge will be minimum fare.

Memberships: The membership of these cruises will be strictly limited, so that everyone will be able to enjoy to the fullest extent the spacious appointments of the *Lapland* and be assured of the most pleasing arrangements for excursions and stops ashore. The Red Star Line reserves the right at any time either before the commencement or en route during the cruises, to require any passenger to withdraw from these cruises, making such adjustment as the Company deems fair and reasonable for the unused portions of any ticket(s) so surrendered.

Surgeon: A fully qualified surgeon is carried. He is authorized to make fixed charges for treatment of illness not contracted on board.

Seats at Table: Seats will be allotted by the Second Steward. Parties desiring to sit together should notify the Company accordingly. Every effort will be made to meet the individual wishes of each passenger.

Deck Chairs: May be hired on application to Deck Steward. The charge is \$2.50 each for the entire cruise.

Rugs: These may be hired on board at \$2.50 each for the cruise. Apply to the Deck Stewards.

Cruise Office: In addition to the Purser's Office and Information Bureau there will be a Cruise Office under the direction of the Cruise Director, where full information regarding shore excursions, will be furnished.

Money Exchange: A Money Exchange Office will be provided on the *Lapland*, where passengers may also cash travelers' checks and letters of credit of the International Mercantile Marine Co. Personal checks, however, cannot be accepted on board.
