#### "THE GRAND TOUR"

Twas the custom in the old days, when the years at the University were ended, to send the young man abroad. He did it in style too. He took his own servants and courier, and he was accompanied by a learned clerk who stood, in the quaint old phrase, in loco parentis. His arrival in a foreign city was hailed as a friendly invasion by the shopkeepers, and he was welcomed by the local gentry. He made a journey to other lands and came back with what was known as a "cosmopolitan polish." The amusing angularities of youth had given way to a knowledge of the world. He had traveled. He had made the "Grand Tour."

Nowadays the need for such an experience has extended to all of us, men and women, though the mechanism of sumptuous travel has been modified to suit modern conditions and ideas. We no longer go trekking across the ocean with our own coach lashed on the deck of the packet, and our postillions extremely languid from mal-de-mer in the steerage. We ourselves no longer have to endure for weeks the stuffy confinement of a prison-cell under the

poop as an alternative to the roaring wind on a sloping deck under bellying canvas.

We no longer make the "Grand Tour" that way. Grandeur for us connotes, not the sulky isolation of a haughty patrician who remains in seclusion during an entire voyage, but rather the pleasant spaciousness and material luxury of a great modern steamship designed to accommodate a community in very much the same easy social apportionment of house-room as one finds in the home-town. This can only be achieved on a very large ship with a limited population. It is important because on a long voyage the happiness of educated people is to a large degree as dependent upon an accepted and available privacy as upon congenial social contacts.



A vacht is luxury, sparkle, chie, It. means golden days spent watching the porpoises swooping up and down in the white, foamy train that follows on the blue floor of the sca. 

BAGGAGE—Trunks nor over thirteen inches high can be placed under berths. Wardrobe trunks may be used in the larger staterooms or placed in the baggage room, to which passengers will have daily access. Passengers are requested to have duplicate keys for all baggage. Baggage (except that carried by the passenger) should be at the piet the day before sailing. It should be securely tagged and labeled. Be sure to give the name of the ship, your name and the number of your stateroom. If the baggage is to be placed in the baggage room, use special tags indicating this fact. Tags are supplied with your ticket. On reaching the pier, consult the baggage master and make certain that all baggage has been delivered on board.

CONDITIONS-The terms and conditions of passage on the cruise are the same as set forth in the regular contract ticket of the Red Star Line. The S. S. Belgenland sails under the command and control of the Red Star Line and patrons are subject to the rules and regulations of that company. The management in issuing any and all tickets for and in making any and all arrangements for and in all matters relating to this cruise and tour is not in the position of and is not to be deemed to act as charterer, common carrier, or inn-keeper, but acts only as agent for the corporations, firms or individuals operating or controlling the steamers, trains, motor cars, carriages, airplanes, boats and any other means of transportation and any service or accommodations including hotels, etc., used in connection with this cruise and tour or incidental or supplemental thereto. The patron agrees in accepting any ticket, service or accommodations on this cruise and tour or incidental or supplemental thereto that he and any person using or enjoying said ticket, service or accommodations will not make any claim against the Red Star Line or American Express Company for any injury or damages to person or property resulting from any act or omission of said corporations, firms or individuals, the identity of whom is to be deemed disclosed to the patron, and neither company shall in any way be responsible or liable for any such injury or damages. The American Express Company assumes no responsibility for baggage ashore, but the management will direct the shipment at "owner's risk" of baggage from place to place, and in the unlikely event of damage, delay or loss, it will do all reasonably within its power to lessen the hardship incurred. deemed desirable that the individual should secure adequate baggage insurance. After the beginning of the cruise refund cannor be made to patrons who do not complete the cruise unless the canceled space is resold for the balance of the cruise or tour, nor will any refund be made to patrons who do not take the regular shore excursions. The management reserves the right at any time to require any patron or patrons to surrender his or their steamship tickets and to withdraw from this cruise and tour, and said Red Star Line will make such adjustment as said company deems fair and reasonable for the unused portions of any tickets

so surrendered.

CRUISE OFFICE—A large and well-appointed Cruise Office will be maintained on board the Belgenland, All business transactions will be handled in this office during stated hours, by expert

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS—There will be no customs problems worth mentioning until the conclusion of the cruise. Passengers will be required to make out the usual customs declarations before landing in New York. Goods purchased abroad will be admitted free to the value of \$100. The balance is subject to duty. Certain articles—notably sealskins and jewelry—of great value, should not be taken on the cruise without securing from the proper U. S. Government authorities a certificate which will prove that they were taken from the United States and not purchased abroad. Passengers who send baggage home in bond on the Beltenland and themselves return later on another boat, should

obtain a certificate from the customs authorities on landing, in the event that they do not use their entire 5:00 exemption. The halance will then be available against duties assessed on the baggage sent ahead in bond. Each member of a family is entitled to the 5:00 exemption, and the articles included within the exemption may be grouped and the allowance made without regard to which member of the group may own them. Fifty cigars or three hundred cigarertes or three pounds of smoking tobacco when brought by adult passenger, if not for sale, may be passed free of duty and internal revenue tax. This tobacco will be admitted free in addition to the exemption allowed. Cigars, cigarettes and tobacco cannot be included within the \$100 exemption. In making purchases in Hawaii or Manila, secure a "Bill of Origim" from the customs officials before leaving. Present this with your declaration on arrival at New York and the goods will be passed without duty.

DECK CHAIRS—Deck chairs and cushions are provided for cruise passengers without extra cost. The location will be assigned by the deck steward. If the passenger has expressed a choice, this choice will be followed in making the assignment, provided such action is consistent with a policy of fairness to all. The exact location of your chair may be ascertained from the deck steward on going aboard.

DENTAL SURGEON—An experienced dental surgeon will accompany the croise and a modern dental equipment will be installed for emergency cases. This is a precautionary measure which we feel sure will be appreciated. Passengers, however, should consult their own dentist before leaving home and have all necessary work attended to. Both the Red Star Line and the American Express Company believe the service thus offered to be of the highest grade and the rates reasonable, but they assume no responsibility in either respect. FORWARDING BAGGAGE IN BOND—Passengers disembarking at Mediterranean ports and wishing to send baggage home on the Belgouland may adopt either of the two following merhods:


(1) Baggage in awart enem's parisal in New York. The passenger

secures receipt from the baggage master on the Belgenland. The baggage will then be placed in bond in the public stores in New York awaiting the owner's arrival. On reaching New York the owner will present the receipt to the baggage master on the pier and obtain releases, which he will present at the public stores, where he will clear the baggage through customs. The charges for storage are \$1.50 per piece for the first month and \$1.00 per piece per month thereafter. (2) Baggage to be forwarded in bond to the owner's home. This is possible if the owner lives in a city where there are customs officials who may clear the baggage through customs. In that case the owner should secure a baggage receipt on the ship, as above, and turn this over to the cruise managers with a written request stating the valuation of the baggage and requesting them to turn it over to the American Railway Express, to be forwarded. This involves a small charge for making entry at the Customs House to secure the release of the baggage in New York, in addition to the express charges for forwarding. Passengers stoppingover in Europe and making a definite reservation to return on the Belvenland from a North Atlantic port at a later date, have the privilege of having baggage on board in charge of the ship's baggage master, to be held for them until re-embarkation. The company is, however, not responsible for such baggage.

INSURANCE—Passengers are recommended to examine the special form of bagage insurance which will be found on sale at any Red Star Line or American Express Company office. This policy was especially devised to cover the needs of cruise patrons, and we believe it is more satisfactory than any policy hitherto offered.

MEDICAL ATTENDANCE—Two experienced physicians and two trained nurses are attached to the Belgonland. Passengers requiring special service from any of the above should consult the ship's physician, from whom also they will ascertain terms. (See also "Vaccination.")

ON SHORE EXCURSIONS—On shore excursions the amount of baggage will necessarily be limited.



PAYMENTS—A preliminary deposit of \$100 will be required, which will hold the reservation until August 1st when an additional payment of 20% is to be made. The balance will be due on October 15th. In case of withdrawal, after October 25th, the space released will be put on sale and refund made if and when accommodations are sold. The management is seeking to bring together a group of people who will prove themselves to be congenial travel companions, and reserves the right to reject any applicant or with-

draw the privilege of cruise membership at any time.

REVENUE TAX—The revenue tax of \$5,00 per passenger is not

included in the price of the cruise.

RUGS—Passengers who do not have steamer rugs of their own
may hire them for the voyage for the sum of \$5,00. Payments
should be made, after going on board, to the deck steward, from
whom the rue will be obtained.

VACCINATION—There are no standard government regulations anywhere along the route of the cruise which require that

passengers shall be vaccinated. Temporary requirements of this sort, however, may be enforced and it would be well for any who have been vaccinated within the six months previous to sailing to carry with them certificates of vaccination. In case quarantine should be enforced against any port, passengers, who have not been vaccinated previously will be vaccinated on board.

STOP-OVER PRIVILEGES-Cruise passengers so desiring, may leave the steamer at any Mediterranean port of call. They will be given open tickets for a later return from a northern European port. These tickets will be available, under the conditions stated below, on the Red Star Line, White Star Line, or Atlantic Transport Line, during the year of 1931. The open return ticket given each passenger will show the room on the Belgenland occupied during the cruise, and will state the price of that room, according to the regular winter tariff of the Belgenland when the ship is in the North Atlantic service. This price determines the value of the return accommodations to which the passenger is entitled, but note that it does not determine the location or character of those accommodations. These tickets will be good for the amount indicated, on any ship of the Lines mentioned where space is available, with the following exceptions: During the crowded months of July, August and Septemberon the White Star Line Southampton service, and during the months of August and September on the other services, the open prepaid tickets will have a value of \$2.45 (the summer minimum rate of the Belgenland) regardless of their value at other seasons. Passengers occupying accommodations rated at a higher figure will pay the difference. The passenger must exchange his open ticket at some office of the company for an actual contract ticket. In the event the open ticket is not used, no refund will be allowed, nor will any refund be made if accommodations are accepted at a rate lower than that indicated on the ticket. The open tickets have no value on any other line than the Red Star, White Star, and Atlantic Transport.
